New Exhibits at the Museum

There are two new exhibits at our museum this summer and both have met with favorable reviews from our visitors. The first new exhibit is "Bodwell Grange" which displays grange items donated to the Museum by the members of Bodwell Grange. Arranged in one of the antechambers of our museum building, this exhibit mirrors the Grange meeting room. Our second exhibit is on loan from the Seventh Grade Red House of the Bath Middle School and is about Malaga Island. This exhibit was done by students after they read *Lizzie Bright and the Buckminster Boy*, a fictional account of Malaga, and presented at school, at the Patten Library and a symposium at USM. This exhibit will be returned to the students at the end of the summer season.

We also have a new exhibit of Civil War artifacts that is scheduled to be ready by the first week in August. This display is on loan from William Mullen of Phippsburg and he plans to change items periodically. Since there were over 100 Phippsburg men who served in the Civil War, we are pleased to sponsor this exhibit.

On November 24, 2007 the Annual PHS Cookie Walk and Victorian Open House brought forth many hungry cookie lovers. A crowd of about 70

folks came by to buy cookies, look at the displays, and peruse the research materials offered at the Museum on the Parker Head Road. Volunteers, dressed in turn-of-the-century garb, greeted the patrons at the door. The new addition became the "cookie room" and



featured a table filled with an incredible display of cookies from which to fill your bag. The Museum was decorated for the Christmas holidays and featured a Victorian tree and other yuletide displays.

The cookie bakers, as usual, did a great job of supplying home-made goodies and a thank-you goes out to all. Don't forget to mark the 2008 calendar on Saturday, November 29 (the Saturday after Thanksgiving), 10am-1pm, as the next Victorian Open House and Cookie

Powderpost Beetles

Not too far into the summer season, it was discovered that the museum building, particularly in the "wood shed", has displayed evidence of a Powderpost Beetle infestation.



These small beetles burrow their way into sapwood to lay their eggs. They leave little pinpoint holes in the wood as they burrow their way in and the mature larvae leave a hole on their way out. Often they look for the same piece of wood each year when they lay eggs. They are most noticeable when they leave fine brown sawdust like material as they bore into the wood. Upon discovery in the Museum, two pest control companies were asked to give recommendations and quotes to effect their removal. The Museum Board has decided to take the lower of the two quotes. In September, after the Museum closes, the Board will clean out the "wood shed", leaving any pieces of wood that have been found to contain the little pin holes, and Orkin pest removal services will treat the shed and any pest infested pieces with a non-toxic chemical solution. This will kill the larvae in the wood itself and then we will have to keep an eye out for any reoccurrence of adult beetles next year. There also are two display pieces to which we will apply anhhhh oil base stain which is supposed to keep the adult beetles from attacking the wood. We hope to have all of this done before the annual Open House and Cookie Walk. It looks like a busy fall.

Who's On The PHS Board?

At the 2007 Annual Meeting, the Board of the Historical Society took on a new look. Peggy Doughty retired after many years as President of the Society, Gloria Gray went off the Board and new people were elected to fill those spots. We thought perhaps our members might like to know who's on the PHS Board!

Our new President is **Jessie Sutfin**. Many people know her as "Jessie Varian". Jessie is the granddaughter of founding Society members Newbold and Dorothy Varian. She grew up in Sebasco Estates and attended school in Phippsburg and Bath. Jessie graduated from high school in Vermont and learned to cook. She opened the "Waters Edge" restaurant in Sebasco which kept her busy during the summer and left her winters free for travel. In 1986, Jessie and new husband Doug Sutfin threw out a permanent anchor in Sebasco and now live in her grandparents house there. Jessie is the Food Services Director at the West Bath Elementary School. She has many community interests, one of which is old Phippsburg Cemeteries. She has been working with efforts to restore the old cemeteries around town. She was elected President of the Society in 2007 and will serve a two year term.



Our Vice-President is **Merry Chapin**. Merry grew up in Yarmouth, Me and attended North Yarmouth Academy. From there it was on to Colby College. Merry and her husband Craig moved to Phippsburg in 1968 and began teaching in the Phippsburg Elementary School. Merry has been very involved with many aspects of community life here in Phippsburg through the years. She joined the Historical Society Board in 2002. She has been active in cemetery restoration, historic preservation and hands on education.



Betsey Morse continues to serve as our Treasurer. Betsey grew up in Concord, NH and graduated from Concord High School. She earned a BS from Westbrook College and worked for several years in hospital laboratories in Boston before she married John Morse and moved to Phippsburg in 1971. Betsey has been involved with the YMCA and several Phippsburg community groups. Betsey works for Sagadahock Real Estate and John G. Morse & Sons. She enjoys genealogy and area history.



Carol Main is our Secretary. Carol was born in Lynn, MA and raised in Saugus. She graduated from Saugus High School in 1956, married Charles Main in 1958. She has lived in the "Old Butler Place" on Dromore Bay since 1969. Carol retired as a full time secretary in 2001 and has busied herself working for Morse River Associates and Kennebec Office Services from her home. 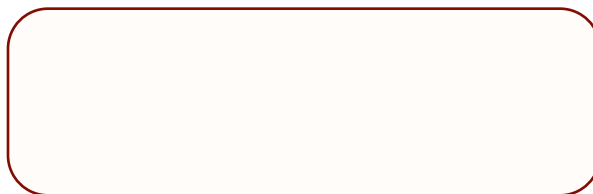
PHIPPSBURG HISTORICAL SOCIETY ANNUAL MEETING
